Sacraments

RECONCILIATION - Every Saturday, 2:30pm-3:30pm at St. John of God; every Wednesday prior to 9am daily Mass at St. John of God; every Thursday following 9am Mass at St. John of God; First Saturdays at St. Raymond following 9am Mass; also Monday and Thursday evenings after Mass (Spanish). Confession also available by appointment with a priest at the Parish Office.

BAPTISM - Parents or legal guardians are welcome to call or make an appointment at the office for baptismal preparation. The Sacrament of Baptism is celebrated either after or during one of the Sunday Masses. Godparents will need an eligibility certificate from their proper pastor.

SACRAMENT OF THE SICK - If someone is seriously ill, hospitalized, preparing for surgery, or failing due to advanced age, they are welcome to call for a priest for the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. Please call the office for arrangements. Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are available to bring Communion to the home-bound. The sick will be remembered in the bulletin for four (4) weeks; longer if requested to continue.

PREPARATION FOR THE SACRAMENTS OF EUCHARIST AND CONFIRMATION - Please enroll your child in our Religious Education Program. Sacraments are given when the parish assesses that the child is ready, usually in the 2nd and 8th grades and after a minimum of 2 years of religious formation. Please call Sr. Kathleen for more information.

SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY - The future bride or groom may contact the parish office requesting to be married. Marriage preparation usually takes 9-12 months. Please speak to or email one of the priests to confirm a date and arrange preparations.

SACRAMENT OF HOLY ORDERS - If a man from our parish feels he may be called to the priesthood or diaconate, he is invited to speak with Fr. King or Fr. Cesar to explore this calling or call the Office of Vocations: 856-583-2864, or visit: camdenpriest.org.



FROM THE ADDRESS OF HIS HOLINESS POPE
LEO XIV TO PARTICIPANTS IN THE CONFER-
ENCE “ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE AND
CARE OF OUR COMMON HOME” ORGANIZED
BY THE CENTESIMUS ANNUS PRO PON-
TIFICE FOUNDATION AND THE STRATEGIC
ALLIANCE OF CATHOLIC RESEARCH UNI-
VERSITIES (December 5, 2025)



“The advent of artificial intelligence is accompanied by rapid and profound changes in society, which affects essential dimensions of

the human person, such as critical thinking, discernment, learning and interpersonal relationships.

How can we ensure that the development of artificial intelligence truly serves the common good, and is not just used to accumulate wealth and power in the hands of a few? This is an urgent question, because this technology is already having a real impact on the lives of millions of people, every day and in every part of the world. As the Social Doctrine of the Church reminds us, and as is clear from the interdisciplinary work you are doing, addressing this challenge requires asking an even more fundamental question: What does it mean to be human in this moment of history?

Human beings are called to be co-workers in the work of creation, not merely passive consumers of content generated by artificial technology. Our dignity lies in our ability to reflect, choose freely, love unconditionally and enter into authentic relationships with others. Artificial intelligence has certainly opened up new horizons for creativity, but it also raises serious concerns about its possible repercussions on humanity's openness to truth and beauty, and capacity for wonder and contemplation. Recognizing and safeguarding what characterizes the human person and guarantees his or her balanced growth is essential for establishing an adequate framework for managing the consequences of artificial intelligence.

In this regard, we must pause and reflect with particular care upon the freedom and inner life of our children and young people, and the possible impact of

technology on their intellectual and neurological development. The new generations must be helped, not hindered, on their path to maturity and responsibility. The well-being of society depends on their ability to develop their talents and respond to the demands of the times and the needs of others, with generosity and freedom of mind. The ability to access vast amounts of data and information should not be confused with the ability to derive meaning and value from it. The latter requires a willingness to confront the mystery and core questions of our existence, even when these realities are often marginalized or ridiculed by the prevailing cultural and economic models. It will therefore be essential to teach young people to use these tools with their own intelligence, ensuring that they open themselves to the search for truth, a spiritual and fraternal life, broadening their dreams and the horizons of their decision making. We support their desire to be different and better, because never before has it been so clear that a profound reversal of direction is needed in our idea of maturing.

In order to build a future together with our young people that achieves the common good and harnesses the potential of artificial intelligence, it is necessary to restore and strengthen their confidence in the human ability to guide the development of these technologies. It is a confidence that today is increasingly eroded by the paralyzing idea that its development follows an inevitable path. This requires coordinated and concerted action involving politics, institutions, businesses, finance, education, communication, citizens and religious communities. Actors from these areas are called upon to undertake a common commitment by assuming this joint responsibility. This commitment comes before any partisan interest or profit, which is increasingly concentrated in the hands of a few. Only through widespread participation that gives everyone the opportunity to be heard with respect, even the most humble, will it be possible to achieve these ambitious goals.”

The main obligations of each member is to promote reverence for the sacred names of God and Jesus. The essential obligation of a Holy Name member might be summed up in the first petition of the Our Father, "Hallowed be thy name." Our members are active in many of our parish ministries and, as an organization, we help support other ministries. The Chapter meets **the first Wednesday of the month at 2pm** in the large meeting room at St. John of God campus.

Sleigh Ride documents two Dominican friars' harrowing mission to celebrate Christmas Mass for three small villages in remote Alaska that have no assigned priest. With only 5 hours of sunlight, during the coldest time of the year, the friars will drive over 28 hours and 548 miles through high winds and snow packed roads bringing Christmas to the ends of the earth.





Pope St. Sylvester I was born in Rome and served as pope from 314 to 335, during one of the most important turning points in Church history. His pontificate began shortly after Emperor Constantine legalized Christianity with the Edict of Milan. Though not directly involved in the theological debates himself, Sylvester supported the work of the First Council of Nicaea in 325, which defended the divinity of Christ against the Arian heresy. He also oversaw the construction of some of the Church's most significant basilicas in Rome, including the original St. Peter's Basilica and St. John Lateran. Leading the Church during its transition from persecution to public recognition, Sylvester guided with humility and stability, ensuring the Church remained rooted in Christ amid newfound freedom and influence. He died in 335 and was buried in the Catacomb of Priscilla in Rome. His feast day is December 31st. —*Catholic Exchange*

These Holy Days of December and January...

We now enter Christmastide, which includes the Christmas Season followed by the Season of Epiphany.

The first 8 days of the Christmas Season is known as the Octave of Christmas. It starts with Christmas on December 25th and ends with the Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God on January 1st.

The Christmas Season continues on from the 1st, ending with the Epiphany of the Lord, which is the first Sunday after the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God — so the Christmas Season may be as short as 9 days, and as long as 15.

Christmastide continues from Epiphany and concludes with the Baptism of the Lord, the Sunday following Epiphany. This period is the Season of Epiphany.



Christmastide is rich with Feast Days and Solemnities:

In December:

- 25th—Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord
- 26th—St. Stephen, the First Martyr
- 27th—St. John, Apostle and Evangelist
- 28th—Feast of the Holy Innocents (the Feast of the Holy Family takes precedence if the 28th is a Sunday, which is the case in 2025)
- 28th—Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph
- 31st—Pope St. Sylvester I

In January:

- 1st—Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God
- 3rd—Memorial of The Most Holy Name of Jesus
- 4th—Solemnity of the Epiphany of the Lord
- 11th—Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

Capítulo Primero

Artículo 1 EL SACRAMENTO DEL BAUTISMO

III LA CELEBRACIÓN DEL SACRAMENTO DEL BAUTISMO

La mistagogia de la celebración

1243 La vestidura blanca simboliza que el bautizado se ha "revestido de Cristo" (Ga 3,27): ha resucitado con Cristo. El cirio que se enciende en el Cirio Pascual, significa que Cristo ha iluminado al neófito. En Cristo, los bautizados son "la luz del mundo" (Mt 5,14; cf Flp 2,15).

El nuevo bautizado es ahora hijo de Dios en el Hijo Único. Puede ya decir la oración de los hijos de Dios: el Padre Nuestro.

1244 La primera comunión eucarística. Hecho hijo de Dios, revestido de la túnica nupcial, el neófito es admitido "al festín de las bodas del Cordero" y recibe el alimento de la vida nueva, el Cuerpo y la Sangre de Cristo. Las Iglesias orientales conservan una conciencia viva de la unidad de la iniciación cristiana, por lo que dan la sagrada comunión a todos los nuevos bautizados y confirmados, incluso a los niños pequeños, recordando las palabras del Señor: "Dejad que los niños vengan a mí, no se lo impidáis" (Mc 10,14). La Iglesia latina, que reserva el acceso a la Sagrada Comunión a los que han alcanzado el uso de razón, expresa cómo el Bautismo introduce a la Eucaristía acercando al altar al niño recién bautizado para la oración del Padre Nuestro.

1245 La bendición solemne cierra la celebración del Bautismo. En el Bautismo de recién nacidos, la bendición de la madre ocupa un lugar especial.

IV. QUIÉN PUEDE RECIBIR EL BAUTISMO

1246 "Es capaz de recibir el Bautismo todo ser humano, aún no bautizado, y solo él" (CIC, can. 864; CCEO, can. 679).




